10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

SAFETY ON THE ROAD

Traffic-related incidents are a significant risk for young pedestrians and cyclists, so understanding road safety is crucial for children's wellbeing. While all road users share responsibility for keeping one another safe, this guide offers strategies for empowering young people to navigate the roads confidently and responsibly.

1 TAKE PRACTICE JOURNEYS

Making 'practice' journeys with children is a great way to help them stay safe, thereby increasing their independence and having real safety conversations as they prepare to travel independently. And having conversations with the sporting electric vehicles - which help them to learn road rules - and something else that they do. Children learn by practicing what they do. 2 BE BRIGHT, BE SEEN

Visibility is key during darker winter days, and all roads need to take extra care to look out for pedestrians. Having bright reflective clothing can help make children more visible to drivers and help to prevent accidents. Encourage children to wear 'light, bright or fluorescent clothing, when it's dark, wear reflective clothing or reflective such as a reflective armband or patch.

3 EYES UP

Encourage children to look up and keep their eyes on the road. Teach them to constantly scan the traffic and practice double-checking the road before crossing - looking right, left and then right again.

4 LIMIT DISTRACTIONS

Where possible, devices that phones should be kept away from children while out and about. If they do use a phone, they should be put away until they've reached their destination. Children should also avoid playing with toys or being distracted by friends. If they need to use a phone, they should be put away until they've reached their destination.

5 SLOW DOWN

Discuss the importance of walking instead of crossing. Immediately, it can be tricky to judge the speed of traffic and spot vehicles that could come in from a side or a hill. For safety, children should stand back before they get to the road and should always 'wait - not stop - before crossing the road. The slower you go, the more time you have to see what's coming. If it's a busy road, it could be a good idea to wait until the traffic is moving slowly.

6 STOP BEFORE THE KERB

Teach children to stop before reaching the kerb - not right at the edge of it. Waiting before they stop to look across the road to see if there's any traffic, where getting close to traffic is dangerous. If there's no oncoming traffic, children should stand back from the road's edge but where they can still see approaching traffic.

7 CROSS SAFELY

Children should always find a safe spot to cross the road, prioritising areas with a zebra crossing or pedestrian crossings. They should use the white edge of the road to cross.
