Stay and Play

Our stay and play sessions will recommence on the 9th June at 10am-11am.

PSHE Curriculum

This half term in PSHE we are looking at growing and changing.

In year 1 and 2 we will be looking at how our emotions, friendships, roles and responsibilities may change as we grow older. We will be talking about moving into the next year group and how this makes us feel. We also teach the names of external body parts using the NSPCC resources.

In year 3 and 4 we will be looking at growing up in more depth. Year 3 will talk about what to do when things become challenging, keeping ourselves clean and basic hygiene routines and start to talk about how our body and emotions are beginning to change. Year 4 then cover this in more depth and discuss what puberty is, about wet dreams and the menstrual cycle and how our bodies are changing. This is covered by a trusted adult and only to year 4s.

In year 5 and 6 we will be talking in more depth about these topics. They will discuss healthy friendships and relationships, their feelings around moving to secondary school (or beginning year 6) and will also learn basic information about how babies are made. These sessions will be delivered to year 5/6 only by the class teacher.

Miss Skilling EYFS AND NURSERY

We have had a great first week back in Early Years. We have started our new book in Literacy 'Rainbow Fish' We have also went on a summer walk to spot for signs of summer! Our topic this term is 'under the sea'.

This week in KS1 we have started our new book called 'Traction Man'. We have been making predictions about what is going to happen in the story and acting out what we think he will do. We also went leaf hunting in science and looked for different types of leaves.

This week in Class 3 we have looked at classification of animals in our science lesson. Lower Key Stage 2 have been sorting animals based on physical characteristics, while Upper Key Stage 2 have been exploring the difference between a genus and a species in classification. Sports Day

On Tuesday 24th June, **ALL children from Nursery to Year 6 will be taking part in our sports day.**

This will take place at Stillington Sports Hall. Children from Terrington and Foston will be taken across by bus, which will leave school immediately after registration. **Parents and families are invited to join us from 12.30pm and may take their children home with them when sports day has finished roughly around 1.45pm.** Buses will still be provided for those children who need them and will return to school before the end of the school day. Afterschool clubs will take place as usual. Please can you let your school office know if you are taking your children home after sports day.

All children should come to school in their PE kit, which is a white t-shirt, black shorts or jogging bottoms and trainers. Children should also wear their school jumper/cardigan and bring their own, clearly named water bottle. Please can we also ask that pupils bring a sun hat and sun cream is applied before school (a labelled bottle can also be brought with them).

There will be **NO hot school dinners** on this day for everyone, so packed lunches of sandwiches will be provided. **If you would like to order a school packed lunch for your child, please let the school office know by Monday 9th June**, so that we can order supplies in good time. Sandwich filling choices are ham, cheese or tuna mayo. If you do not want a school packed lunch, then please provide one for your child, as there will be no other option on this day.

If you plan to attend sports day, please bring your own chair.

Nursery children who do not attend nursery on Tuesdays are also invited to join us. If your child would like to come for the day or the afternoon, please let the class teacher know.

Sharing Images Online

School is often a time chock-full of milestones for your child/ren and you may well be eager to share accomplishments with the world. In today's digital age, sharing images of such precious moments on social media is commonplace, and -while that's a lovely thing to do- it does come with some risks attached. The guide attached can help you to consider the potential dangers and make informed choices about safely sharing photos of children online. With children who have access online themselves it is important to have conversations with them about these dangers.



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about SHARING PHOTOS ONLINE

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?
 School is often a time chock-full of milestones for your child/ren and you may well be eager to share their accomplishments with the world. In today's digital age, sharing images of such precious moments on social media is commonplace, and -while that's a lovely thing to do- it does come with some risks attached. This guide can help parents and carers to consider the potential dangers and make informed choices about safely sharing photos of their children online.

INVASIONS OF PRIVACY
 Even when you think you've set the right settings in your photos, something online can see your photos and use them in ways you don't intend. Privacy settings are still important, though, as it's always wise to ensure your social media accounts have been set up to be as private as possible. It's also important to be aware of what you share and to be clear about who you share it with.

REVEALING PERSONAL DETAILS
 Small details in photos can often reveal personal information. Backgrounds can give clues to where you are, what you're doing, and who you're with. It's important to be aware of what you share and to be clear about who you share it with.

MISUSE OF IMAGES
 Once something has been shared online, it's almost impossible to get it deleted. Photos can show up in search engines and can be downloaded, reposted, and shared without consent. There's also the potential for someone's images to be used in advertising purposes (such as in many cases, but I flag!) or even more sinister purposes, such as cyber-bullying or serious forms of exploitation.

ONLINE GROOMING
 Pictures that convey details about your child's interests, activities, or daily routines can very often be seen by people who are not intended to see them. They might use this knowledge to pretend to be the same age as your child or to have a shared hobby. Essentially, the more a predator knows about a young person, the easier it is for them to build trust, sometimes appearing as a friend.

PRESSURE TO PLEASE
 With their parents or carers, share notable moments and achievements. It's important to be aware of what you share and to be clear about who you share it with.

IMPACT ON DIGITAL FOOTPRINT
 Every photo of a child posted online contributes to their digital footprint. People who have never been in contact with your child can see it, and this information can be used in ways you don't intend. It's important to be aware of what you share and to be clear about who you share it with.

Advice for Parents & Carers

REVIEW SETTINGS REGULARLY
 Make sure your social media's secure in terms of who can view your content or see your location (only family and trusted friends, for example). Privacy settings aren't foolproof, but they do make it tougher for strangers to access your pics. Revisiting your settings regularly is also a good starting point for conversations with your child about managing their own social accounts when they're older.

CHECK YOUR PHOTOS
 Photos of your child shouldn't provide any clues to where they live or go to school, even a house number, street name, or car number plate. If you really want to share a particular pic, you could post a watermark or a text version, which stops it being reposted as those images are less appealing to download or reproduce.

THINK AHEAD
 Try to consider the longer-term implications of what you post. Would you be happy with that photo being online in 10 years' time? Would your child still be OK with an image when they're older? Once your child is mature enough, you could ask for their consent before posting. It respects their privacy, fosters trust and understanding, and helps them to start thinking about their own online life.
